20th December 2020 [Cycle B Year 1] **Fourth Sunday of Advent** 2 Samuel 7:1-5, 8-16 | Psalm 88 (89) Romans 16: 25-27 | Luke 1:26-38

What is announced to Mary in today's Gospel is the revelation of all that the prophets had spoken. It is, as Paul declares in today's Epistle, the mystery kept secret since before the foundation of the world (see Ephesians 1:9; 3:3-9).

Mary is the virgin prophesied to bear a son of the house of David (see <u>Isaiah 7:13–14</u>). And nearly every word the angel speaks to her today evokes and echoes the long history of salvation recorded in the Bible.

Mary is hailed as the "daughter Jerusalem," called to rejoice that her king, the Lord God, has come into her midst as a mighty saviour (see Zephaniah 3:14-17).

The One whom Mary is to bear will be Son of "the Most High"—an ancient divine title first used to describe the God of the priest-king Melchizedek, who brought out bread and wine to bless Abraham at the dawn of salvation history (see Genesis 14:18-19).

He will fulfil the covenant God makes with His chosen one, David, in today's First Reading. As we sing in today's Psalm, He will reign forever as highest of the kings of the earth, and He will call God "my Father." As Daniel saw the Most High grant everlasting dominion to the Son of Man (see Daniel 4:14; 7:14), His kingdom will have no end.

He is to rule over the house of Jacob—the title God used in making His covenant with Israel at Sinai (see Exodus 19:3), and again used in promising that all nations would worship the God of Jacob (see Isaiah 2:1-5).

Jesus has been made known, Paul says today, to bring all nations to the obedience of faith. We are called with Mary today to marvel at all that the Lord has done throughout the ages for our salvation. And we too must respond to this annunciation with humble obedience—that His will be done, that our lives be lived according to His word.

Postscript to Christmas Offering

Arising from last week's piece on making a Christmas Offering to Fr Anthony, a question has been raised by some on whether bank card payments made via the SumUp machine can be topped up with Gift Aid. The short answer is Yes, but how?

GiveALittle works with SumUp to achieve this. Initially one has to make a donation to St Margaret's using the GiveALittle website. In doing this one can select the Gift Aid option and fill in the Gift Aid necessaries. Thereafter, one can donate via SumUp or via GiveALittle, and so long as you use the same bank card, the donation will be automatically recognised as a Gift Aided donation. [Note: Of course, you can make a donation easily and simply using the SumUp machine without adding Gift Aid.]

Over 300,000 people facing Covid-19 bereavement

Christmas 2020 is likely to be very different this year as Covid-19 safety restrictions will limit church celebrations and family gatherings. But also - more than 300,000 people in the UK will be suffering with bereavement - due to Covid-19, with communities in Essex, Kent, Lancashire, Birmingham and Surrey the most affected, according to research by the charity crisis bereavement service *Sudden*.

The charity is highlighting the importance of immediate support to help people deal with the unexpected death of a loved one, to help them cope, stay safe, deal with urgent practical and financial challenges and reduce the risk of mental health issues including Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

Papal Visit to Iraq in 2021

Iraq's Christians have welcomed news that Pope Francis is set to go to Iraq next Spring - the first time any pontiff will have visited the country.

Syriac Catholic Archbishop Nizar Semaan of Hadiab-Erbil warmly greeted the announcement made recently that Pope Francis will visit Iraq from 5th-8th March 2021 - including Erbil, Mosul and Qaraqosh in the Nineveh Plains where Christians were forced from their homes by Daesh (ISIS).

In the Recent Apostolic Letter entitled 'Patris corde' Pope Francis has proclaimed a special 'Year of St Joseph' beginning on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception 2020 and extending to that same feast in 2021.

Francis wrote *Patris corde* against the backdrop of the Covid-19 pandemic, which, he says, has helped us see more clearly the importance of "ordinary" people who, though far from the limelight, exercise patience and offer hope every day. In this, they resemble Saint Joseph, "the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence," who nonetheless played "an incomparable role in the history of salvation."

The Home Secretary, Priti Patel, has said that she will be looking at the possibility of introducing buffer zones around abortion centres across the UK. Two previous Home Secretaries looked into this, in the last couple of years and both felt that it would be wrong to introduce such legislation. 
